THE NEW VENUE

Perhaps the biggest item of the first month of the indoor season concerns not so much how fast (or not) New Jersey athletes have been running, but where they have been competing. For the introduction of the new track at the Jersey City Armory has been the major topic of discussion in a state literally starved for suitable venues.

There is both good and bad news to report about the revamped venue which was the site (with the now razed Newark Armory) of the "rebirth" of indoor track in the state almost 50 years ago. The good definitely outweighs the bad, for the new Mondo surface has already produced several marks that indicate that this may well be the second fastest oval in the state, outshined only by the banked 200M oval at Lawrenceville.

The bad is that the renovation job is not yet complete: the lighting has still be to upgraded, there is no central announcing system and, while the existing "facilities" have been improved, they need augmentation before large major meets will be practical there.

To date, the armory has hosted two large invitation meets and several "local" championships, mostly relays. With both balconies now available for seating, the smaller meets provide no problem, but both invitationals have run overlong for a variety of reasons and have also provided some problems of crowd control.

There is also the question of proper facilities for the official tables and the press. The solution, if possible, would be to remove the present seating from the section nearest the finish line, allowing easy communication with the officials stationed there.

Though all meets to date have been hand-timed, we are assured there will be no problem with using auto-timing systems there. They were supposed to debut at the Ocean-Monmouth doubleheader on Jan. 15, but a snowstorm intervened. The timing equipment got there OK over icy roads, but the morning Ocean meet was postponed and, with a seven-hour wait for the afternoon Monmouth meet, the timing crew decided discretion was the better part of valor and went home.

We must remember that the NY Armory took several years to reach its present status. Its lighting also was inadequate the first year and, of course, the present track was not installed immediate. And, while the NY drillshed is no longer an active military installation, the JC Armory definitely is active and will remain so. Nor is it exclusively a track and field venue: several major collegiate and scholastic basketball games are scheduled this winter and the Jersey City Department of Recreation conducts other activities there: teams attending the Bill Reid Invitational Jan. 13 were treated to a trampoline exhibition as they entered the facility.

So while the armory is a welcome—and long-awaited—addition to indoor facilities in the state, it is hardly a final answer. Just ask the South Jersey schools who got just one meet at Haverford this winter and have been spending hours upon hours getting back and forth to meets. (The Oakcrest team left Jersey City about midnight after the Reid meet with at least a two-hour trip home ahead of them.)
