The Maroons, second in Bergen County last year, have all their top runners back and it wouldn't be surprising if Ridgewood's best prove to be the best in

Jock Brown's dream team is composed of twins Mary Ellen and Patricia Mileski, Carol Dickstein, Kathy Duffy, Barbara Remmers, Colleen Wright, and Chris Speranza. And Brown adds, "Every year I get surprised [by incoming fresh-

Ridgewood is the deepest team, but it is not the only team in the County with talented runners. Two girls to watch closely are Pascack Valley's Mary Ellen McGowan and Ramsey's Kathy Jones. Other All-County first- and second-team selections returning include: Laura Falci of Saddle Brook; Sue Ellen McSweeney of Old Tappan; Pam Okolita of Cliffside Park, and Cheryl Wagner of Pascack Valley.

A closer look at the leagues and individuals follows:

NNJIL

Ridgewood's top six are back. In addition, Patty Mileski, who last year ran on the junior high team, joins the squad.

Ridgewood won't be the only team in the Northern New Jersey Interscholastic League to watch. Bergenfield, Hackensack, and Teaneck have separate girls programs and should be competitive.

Bergenfield lost three top runners but coach Frank Schorling still has a pair of sophomores, Maria Nordberg and Wendy Korn, and senior Cathy Martin to lead the team.

There are four seniors on Ed Church's Hackensack team, and for the first time, the Comets have a full team. Only one, Renita Terry, has any cross-country experience, however. Church looks to Jenny Osborne to be a a big help.

"I expect that Ridgewood will destroy us," says Church, "but we should be respectable. We won't be lousy."

Teaneck coach Betsy Lehner is looking to Melissa Cohen, Judy Palmer, and

Adrian Brown to help her team. Lehner says she feels lucky just to have a team. The Board of Education reinstated on Sept. 2 the program that had been cut in the spring.

Both Clifton and Wayne Valley should field competitive squads. So far Russ DeVries, the Wayne Valley coach, has only four runners, but one of them is Hanna Herman, a junior. Clifton is led by three experienced runners: senior Lauren Bakelaar; and juniors Dagmar Schmidt and Kay Magome.

Passaic Valley also will field a full team for the first time. Twelve girls showed up for the preseason meeting. Fair Lawn, although it lost some of its best runners, has Sue Liebeskind, a senior, to lead the team. Bloomfield has Nancy Deneka returning and Paramus

Whereas Ridgewood fields the area's best team, the Northern Bergen Interscholastic League is the most competitive. Last year's league and County champion Old Tappan has lost Colleen Dunn, Debbie Meberg, and Megan Murtaugh to graduation, making Pascack Valley is a threat to the Knights' reign.

Pascack Valley's Bill Henshaw's tone, however, is a conservative one in discussing his team's prospects. "They're [Old Tappan] the defending champs, and they're the only ones to win the league championship since we started. But we'll close the gap on them."

PV's Mary Ellen McGowan is easily one of the County's top harriers. Backing up McGowan, on a team that Henshaw refers to as "the best girls team I've coached," are juniors Cheryl Wagner, Kelly Luther, and Sue Parker, senior Kate Veraldo, and sophomores Pam Farrell and Stephanie Witt.

Old Tappan, coached by Bruce Hyde, won't be a pushover. Sue Ellen McSweeney, a sophomore, should lead

the Knights to another winning season. Numerous individuals should have outstanding seasons. River Dell has a freshman, Michele Denning, who already has impressed some observors. The Golden Hawks suffered no major graduation

Noreen O'Connor, Trish O'Connor, Jean Hallecks, and Stacy Kornhauser.

Dumont's chief rival is Saddle Brook although both Tenafly and Cliffside Park have class runners. Gene D'Alessandro's Falcons should again be paced by Laura

Eileen Keyes, Janie Quinn, and Lisa Fallon head the Tenafly squad. No. 2 runner Kelly O'Toole will be with the team only for a month, as her family is moving to Florida. Cliffside Park is led by Pam Okoliata, who was sixth in last year's County meet. Seniors Roxanne MacDonald and Alemka Grandov back her up.

Ridgefield Park has Lisa Bercelli, a senior, and Jill Hopps, a sophomore, as

losses and returning are cocaptains Corinne Linardic and Carol Ann Denning, Michele's older sister. Nonetheless, coach Bob Stevenson admits only to, "I'll be very happy with third.

Westwood and Northern Highlands will give everyone a good run. Westwood's nucleus is Barbara Gradley, Ann Ruiz, Dawn Melie, and Carole Grisoni. The Highlanders are paced by underclasswomen Julie Craig, Cathy Curran, Alison Farbaniec, Liz Kadel, Carol Ann Alvarez, Pam Bruce, and Jane Newett.

Demarest lost all but Ann Marie Ulrich to graduation and is rebulding. Coach John Scullion was encouraged by the Nrsewomen turnout, but realizes his league is a tough one. "If you get past the NBIL, you're OK in the Group 3 anywhere," he says.

Trish Papale and Karen Fields, both juniors, are the experienced members on the Wayne Hills squad.

This is the first season Indian Hills has fielded a girls team. Neither Ramapo nor Pascack Hills will field a full team. But Ramapo coach Rich Mullins adds, "I'm working my tail off trying to get one together."

Dumont is the preseason favorite in the Bergen County Scholastic League American Division. Coach Norm Fink says he has a "solid five" in Pattie McCluskey,

its best runners. Lyndhurst has three girls who will run along with the boys, Kathy Robinson, Dana Damiani, and Sue Olein. It's the first time any girls have

run for Lyndhurst. Englewood has no team and Garfield has only one runner with experience in Cindy Cilwik. Fort Lee and New Milford are of questionable quality.

BCSL National and Olympic

Cresskill, Secaucus, and Rutherford are agan the better teams in the National division. Cresskill graduated some starters, but coach Tom Francese has Trisha Mdden, Diane Connolly, Yvonne Solari, Ann Borelli, and Eileen Hammarstrom returning and feels his team has a fine shot at the league title.

Secaucus, second in the State sectionals last year, should give Cresskill its hardest intra-league fight. Donna Boxbeck is the only senior on the young squad. Marie Martorano, Chris Corradino, Marybeth Gaidis, and Nancy Jacobson fill out the roster. Coach Stan Fryczinski's biggest worry is avoiding the slew of injuries

that crippled his team last year. No depth is the problem Rutherford's Jay Cuny expects to have. Bianca O'Connell leads the Bulldogs with Helen Quinn and Rose Marie Delvesco other experienced runners.

The rest of the National Division is thin. Individuals who could have fine seasons are: Pat Turcynski and Claudia Schs of Becton, Ruth Winkler and Carol Colborn of Hasbrouck Heights, Pam Mul-

Once again, Ridgewood had an outstanding cross country season. The Girls' Varsity won every major league championship they entered and placed second in the States Championship, losing first to North Hunterdon. In the Boys' Varsity, Tom Hughes finished 12th as the top Bergen individual.

Tom Hughes, Paul O'Leary, Carol Dickstein, Kathy Duffy, Sue Hart, Mary Ellen and Pat Mileski, are all on the First Team All League (composite of the best runners in the Northern New Jersey Interscholastic League). Jim Ketterson, Kevin Murphy, Doug Smith, and Chris McKenna, are on the Second Team. Mike Jones and Anya Kannengeiser have Honorable Mention in the League Standing.

Here are the results of the First Team members from Ridgewood (in alphabetical order): Carol Dickstein (Sr.) — Placed 3rd in NBIL (Northern Bergen Interscholastic League) championship (19:56), placed 3rd in state Group Four sectionals (19:43), took 6th in Bergen Meet of Champions (19:39), 8th in Manhattan Invitational (15:29.8), was 11th in state Group Four championships (19:55), and finished 50th in the State Championship. In the States, she was bothered by a sinus infection.

Kathy Duffy (Sr.) – Was 4th in Bergen Meet of Champions (19:33), was 4th in NNJIL Championship (19:44), was 12th in Group Four State Championships (19:58), took 15th in Manhattan Invitational (16:00.7), was 19th in State Group Four Sectionals (20:56). She suffered an injury during the state championship and did not come in the top 50.

Sue Hart (Jr.) — Ran 4th in State Group Four sectional championships (19:55), took 5th in NNJIL championships (19:45), ran 14th in state Group Four championships (20:08), placed 23rd in Manhattan Invitational (16:13.2), and came in 32nd in the State Championship.

Tom Hughes (Sr.) — Won NJSIAA (New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association) Group Four sectional championship (16:00.3), won Bergen Meet of Champions (16:02.7), won NNJIL (Northern New Jersey Interscholastic League) championship (16:07), placed fifth in Manhattan "A" Invitational (12:59.7), was 9th in NJSIAA Group Four champsionships (16:26), and finished 12th in the State Championship.


Mike Jones (Sr.) – Placed 10th in State Group Four sectionals (16:50), was 33rd in State Group Four championships (17:07).

Dumont junior gains victory in Girls B run

WEST PATERSON - Patti McCluskey wasn't an outstanding cross-country runner last year. McCluskey finished sixth in the Bergen County Scholastic League American Division race last year, and didn't even place in the top 15 of the State sectional meet.

However, McCluskey had a sensational season in track, finishing third at 1,500 meters in the All-Groups meet, and she began this cross-country season with a more positive attitude. "I finally caught on to cross-country and I know what I'm doing," said the Dumont junior after winning the Varsity B girls race at the Passaic County Coaches Invitational meet yesterday.

"I'm working harder, and I like the longer races better because you get to

see more things on the course. I'm a lot better runner this year.

McCluskey outkicked Ramsey junior Kathy Jones up the final hill at Garret Mountain yesterday to become the only area runner to win in the three varsity girls races over the new 5,000-meter

Pequannock won the Brace. The perennially powerful Skyline team, led by newcomer Wendy Gilman in fourth place, took six of the first 26 places. The Panthers scored 69 points to 102 for Ramsey. Passaic County had some very good performances in the A and C races. Hunterdon Central, the 1979 all-groups champion, used a 1-2 finish by Lorrie Butterfield and Cricket Batz to win the A race.

But Kennedy, which got a boost this week when frosh whiz Shirley Daniel, believed sidelined for the season, was given the clearance to run, had a third place from Stephanie Jackson that helped push the Knights into second place overall. Passaic County champ Karen Kirkland, fighting a slump, was 18th.

Julie Ott of West Milford was an impressive sixth in the A race, followed by Eastside's Sonia McKnight and ninthplace finisher Caroline Roos.

Joan Profita and Pam Farinella were third and sixth, respectively, in the C race, leading Paul VI to a close sixthplace finish. The Patriots were Group 1 sectional champs in 1978 but fought injuries all last season. .

Tiny Lisa Pakutka of Hopatcong established the course record in the C race, winning in 18:56, just ahead of freshman Stacey Aromando, who led Whippany Park to the team title.

Colleen Murphy of DePaul had the top Passaic time of the day, finishing third in the B race and seventh overall. She was followed by Profita (10th overall), Farinella (15th), Jackson (16th), Ott, McKnight, Roos, Chris Steiner of West Milford, Kirkland and Colleen Cooks of Kennedy.

McCluskey and Jones were 1-2 for Bergen and 4-6 overall. Eileen Keyes of Tenafly (11th overall), Colleen Murphy of Ramsey (17th), Kathy Kreusch of Ramapo, Judy Palmer of Teaneck, Dawn Breen of Demarest, Cathy Marylin of Bergenfield, freshman Michele Denning of River Dell, and Linda Rahal of Old Tappan were the other leading Bergen runners.

Some of the better area teams were at other invitationals throughout the Metropolitan area. Ridgewood's boys took the Varsity A-1 race at the St. Anthony's Invitational in Smithtown, N.Y. Tom Hughes ran 16:26.9 to finish second pacing the Maroons to a 94-95 margin over Pearl River.

The Maroons got an 18th place finish from Mike Jones and good races from Kevin Murphy (20th), Paul O'Leary (24th), Jim Ketterson (30th) and Doug Smith (34th).

The Ridgewood girls didn't fare as well. With Patty Mileski passing out 150 yards from the finish, Barbara Remmers and Colleen Wright missing the race with illness and Bergen 3-4 champ Mary Ellen Mileski running an uncharacteristically poor 29th, the Maroon girls were second behind awesome Valley Stream Central,

Carol Dickstein ran eighth, followed by steady Cathy Duffy (12th), transfer Sue Hart (17th) and Chris McKenna (32nd).

Pascack Valley's girls took seventh in a strong Varsity A field at the Shore Invitational, State Group 3 defending champ Mary Ellen McGowan of PV was second to Mary Beth Hogan of Cranford on the state course at Holmdel. Sue Parker was 20th.

Ernie Lugo's fourth place (in 13:17) in the championship race helped St. Joseph's to seventh place in the Iona Invitational at Van Cortlandt Park. Don Bosco was fifth in the Catholic race with ninth place finisher Tom McGiveny running ninth. Ron Weiss of Hackensack was 21st in the Public schools race with a 13:30.

Ridgewood girls take team title

Ridgewood's girls stamped themselves as the team to beat, not only in New Jersey, but in the East yesterday, by winning the Eastern championship cross-country race of the Manhattan Invitational at Van Cortlandt Park. The Maroons placed five runners in the first 23 spots against a class field to cruise to a 71-99 win over Valley Stream Central. Pearl River was third with 109 points.

Carol Dickstein led the Ridgewood finishers, running 15:29.8 for eighth place, followed by Patti Mileski, who ran ninth in 15:33.6 on the 2.5 mile course. Kathy Duffy (15th-16:00.7), Mary Ellen Mileski (16th-16:01.5) and Sue Hart (23rd-16:13.2) completed the stellar performance. Pascack Valley was eighth in the championship race, helped by a 15:18.4 fourth-place finish by Mary Ellen McGowan.

Paul VI's Pam Farinella and Joan Profita were 9th and 14th respectively, in the Girls B race. Ridgewood's Tom Hughes was fifth in the Boys A race in 12:59.7, leading the Maroon boys to a fifth place finish with 147 points. DeWitt Clinton won the race with 97 points, and Ridgewood finished just 13 points out of third. Doug Smith was 28th in 13:48.2

% Don Neubert of Ridgefield ran an impressive 13:26.2 to take ninth in the Boys B race. Bergen Catholic was fourth with 144 points on the strength of a tight pack and the 21-22 finish of Bill Fletcher (13:38.4) and Brian Daly (13:39.3). Rich DeFillipis' 19th-place finish (13:36.5) helped Paramus Catholic to an eighth place finish.

Saddle Brook was sixth in the C race with 152 points, led by George Gusciora and Joe Barno who finished 11th and 17th. John Boyle of Rutherford was 21st in that race.

River Dell was fourth in the Boys B race with 153 points. Junior Pat McGlynn was ninth while teammate Mike Whitaker ran 18th. River Dell's girls were sixth in the Girls A race, paced by freshman Michele Denning, who was 20th. Laura Falci of Saddle Brook was 12th in the Girls B race.

Ridgewood girls run 2nd

Downpour, mud produce bad times

NEW YORK - No, that wasn't Mark Spitz winning the Eastern States Cross-Country championship at Van Cortlandt Park yesterday, and the Ducks didn't win the team race, either. But Spitz and webfooted creatures would have felt very much at home in the rain-drenched meet held in what most area coaches agreed were the worst conditions they had ever seen for an event.

"About four years ago, there was a worse day on the day of the Manhattan meet," said Paramus Catholic coach Mike Grady. "But they called that one off, even though all the teams were there. Today was the worst day I've ever seen where the race was actually run."

Despite the abominable conditions, Ridgewood and North Hunterdon held a thrilling preview of the State Meet of Champs in the Girls A race, which was reduced to 12 teams from an expected field of 26 because of the weather. The Central Jersey school outran Ridgewood, 50-54, in a race in which each team

still a very impressive field.

"I'm disappointed," girls coach Jock Brown said. "We seemed to be ahead by the bridge [with about 1/2 mile to go on the 21/2-mile course] but we lost it in the

As the race splashed towards the finish, Ridgewood seemed to have a slight edge as Patty Mileski and Carol Dickstein finished fourth and seventh behind the first North Hunterdon runner, second-place finisher Sharon Greene. But North Hunterdon, odds-on favorite for the Group 3 title Nov. 15, got its threesome of Stacy Bilotta, Marge Demarrais, and Tracy Bigley ahead of Ridgewood's pack of Cathy Duffy, Sue Hart, and Mary Ellen placed its top five runners in the top 16 of Mileski. The 15th-place finish of Liz Ludwigson cemented the four-point win.



Kennedy, Ramsey girls win

RIDGEWOOD — Meet director Jock Brown, whose own Ridgewood girls team was running on the other side of the Hudson, calls the Ridgewood Cross-Country Invitational a low-keyed alternative to the Manhattan Invitational.

But to the winners — Eastside's Leon Finney, Ramsey's Kathy Jones, Dumont's Pattie McCluskey, and the girls teams of Kennedy and Ramsey — the meet was neither low-key nor lackluster.

Finney had won a race and lost one to archrival Tony Williams of Kennedy. Having failed to catch up with Williams in last week's Passaic Invitational, Finney kept ahead of Williams from the start of this race, a strategy that led to his other win over Williams.

"Leon's strides are too large for Williams [to overcome]" said Don Bornstein, the Eastside coach. "He demoralized Williams by not letting him get by."

There was no head-to-head contest between Jones and McCluskey yesterday. But Jones ended up the nominal winner, based on time, by taking the girls varsity B race in 19:03.4, while McCluskey won the A race in 19:17.5.

Both, however, would have liked to see a one-on-one match. "I was really looking forward to it [racing against McCluskey]," said Jones, who was expecting a rematch until the meet was split into groups.

The junior placed behind McCluskey at

the Passaic Coaches Meet by six seconds, a loss that left her feeling like "I beat myself."

On the sidelines of this race, McCluskey encouraged Jones to a good time. That somehow surprised Ramsey's No. 1 runner.

"Sportsmanship only goes so far," said Jones as she awaited to be awarded a pewter bowl for fastest time.

WEST PATERSON — Tom Hughes seemed to have vanished, or so it must have appeared to the other runners in the final half mile of the Bergen County Meet of Champions Varsity Boys race at Garret Mountain yesterday. Approaching the base of the hill, Hughes had a lead of more than 25 yards, and he kept it.

With his 16:02 winning time, the Ridgewood senior established once and for all that for 1980, he is the best runner in the County. That reputation exhilirates rather than pressures Hughes: "I don't mind the buildup that you're supposed to win. It makes me run faster."

Dumont's Pattie McCluskey is not a runner to be dismissed. A group of coaches predicted she would finish in the top seven, but not first, and that helped her.

"I hate when they underestimate me," said McCluskey, who finished third in the groups meet Saturday. "It [groups meet] made me the underdog, so, I guess, I got to work on my own [without pressure]."

Bergen Catholic won its sixth team championship in eight years by 26 points over Northern Highlands and 27 over Ridgewood. "It's a nice feeling. We've been chasing them all year," said Bergen Catholic coach Dave Faherty of Ridgewood. He gave credit to two of his runners, seniors Brian McVeigh and Bob Daly. "They got the team together. They really worked hard."

The Ridgewood girls eased into first spot with 20 points. Second place Pascack Valley had 65.

Both runners said they didn't feel they'd reached their peaks. "I'm still coming on," said the winner. "I feel I'm getting stronger." The runner-up echoed that with, "I haven't peaked yet." Both get their chance at the State sectionals Saturday, where they'll be entered in separate races.

McCluskey wasn't in control of her race, midway through it, although she was in the top three. Instead, she waited for the approach of the hill.

"I didn't think McCluskey had anything left at the hill," said Patty Mileski of Ridgewood, who finished second. "But she was really strong." McCluskey had plenty left at the bottom of the final hill, her favorite hill on her favorite course. She wrested control from Pascack Valley's Mary Ellen McGowan there.

Mileski, who is the County Group 3-4 champion, overtook McGowan in the last 20 yards of the race. The runner-up spot disappointed Mileski.

Bergen Catholic will not be competing in the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association sectional crosscountry championships this weekend, which are limited to public schools. Instead, the Crusaders will be competing in the New Jersey Catholic Track Conference meet at Warinanco Park, Elizabeth.

BC, however, will be following what happens in the races at Garret Mountain, West Paterson. The Crusaders are interested in preserving the No. 1 status in Bergen County that they earned Tuesday by winning the Bergen County Meet of Champions.

"I was so happy when Ridgewood collapsed in the Meet of Champs," said Crusader coach Dave Faherty, whose team won its sixth championship in eight years. "Then my feelings inside were mixed. I like Larry Coyle [Ridgewood coach], and I like his kids. I knew the turmoil they were going through.

"I'm impressed with our kids, and I want to see them run against the top County schools again in the State Meet of

Champions," said Faherty. "Our seniors got the team moving Tuesday, and I'd like to see how we would do in the State Meet of Champions, a very emotional race just like the Bergen meet was."

Bergen's road to the Meet of Champs starts in the Parochial A race next week at Holmdel. "We're not going after CBA [Christian Brothers Academy]. There's no way to beat them unless they make a wrong turn, but we want to make a strong showing."

One team that hopes to make a strong showing Saturday is Ridgewood, the trifavorite in Group 4 with Kennedy and five-time defending champion Memorial. The Maroons may be without No. 2 runner Kevin Murphy, who suffered a recurrence of the mysterious ailment that led to his withdrawal in the Northern New Jersey Interscholastic League championships two weeks ago.

Ridgewood's Tom Hughes is the favorite in the individual race, along with Kennedy's Tony Williams, Eastside's Leon Finney, Snyder's Tony Hoyrd, and Francisco Lugo of Memorial. Wayne Valley, Hackensack, and North Bergen are also

strong contenders to finish among the top five teams and qualify for the Holmdel meet.

In Group 3, Northern Highlands, a surprising second in the Bergen Meet of Champs, must hold off Hudson County champion Emerson of Union City. The twosome of Dave Marshall and John Clements should enable the Highlanders to outrun Emerson and junior Sergio dela Vega. Ridgefield Park's Rich Byrne, Old Tappan's Mark Tabasco, and River Dell's Pat McGlynn should help their teams threaten for the top five, with Byrne the slight individual favorite. Dumont is another potential Holmdel qualifier.

Sussex County schools should dominate in Group 2, with Kittatinny, Hopatcong, and Sussex Tech evenly matched. Hopatcong's Scott DeRidder is the individual favorite, along with Fort Lee's Mark Costello and Wilton Adams Newton's Danny Reynolds is also a threat. Rutherford and Saddle Brook may be local qualifiers.

In Group 1, Cresskill, which finished a strong fifth in the Meet of Champs, should win by more than the three points it won by in the County Group meet. Mahwah, a close second in the Group meet, had some problems in the Meet of Champs. Individually, Don Neubert of Ridgefield has assumed the favorite's role held all season by Cresskill's Mike Fezza. Fezza, who ran superbly in the first month of the season, may struggle to hold off teammate Bill Hammarstrom if his puzzling slump continues.

HOLMDEL — Ridgewood outclassed the Group 4 field at the New Jersey State Interscholastic

Athletic Association Girls Cross-Country Championships yesterday, becoming the only Bergen-Passaic team to qualify for the State Meet of Champions.

Ridgewood had 35 points while runner-up Hunterdon Central, the defending champion, had 113.

Coach Jock Brown wasn't pleased with his coaching during the race, especially when the sub-

ject was third-place finisher Mary Ellen Mileski. "I really blew it with Mary Ellen," he said. "She wanted to go a little faster, but I told her to take it slower in the beginning."

Mileski had too much left at the end of the race. Brown had encouraged the sophomore to stay 10 to 20 yards behind Hunterdon Central's top runner, Lorrie Butterfield. That distance proved too much for Mileski to make up in the stretch.

"I'll have to go right to the front the next time," said the sophomore, who will again meet Butter-field here Saturday in the Meet of Champions.

Ridgewood placed five runners in the top 15. Trailing Mary Ellen were Patty Mileski, seventh; Carol Dickstein, 11th; Kathy Duffy, 12th; and Sue Hart, 14th. Dickstein, Duffy, and Hart will have to equal or better their performances next week

when they run against Group 3 champion North Hunterdon if Ridgewood is to win the meet title. North Hunterdon won with 27 points against runner-up Randolph's 140.

Two Bergen Group 3 runners, Dumont's Pattie McCluskey and Pascack Valley's Mary Ellen McGowan, qualified as individuals for the final meet.

McCluskey's second-place finish in Group 3 wasn't surprising, nor was the first-place finish of Summit's Theresa Gschwind. McCluskey tried to keep pace with Gschwind through the first half of the race, but the Dumont junior conceded that she realized by the midpoint that she couldn't.

McCluskey, whose time was 19:20, said she had some trouble holding off North Hunterdon's leader Sharon Greene, who finished third. "I took Greene

on the hills, but she surprised me with her strength at the end," said McCluskey, who finished four seconds ahead of Greene. Defending champion McGowan finished sixth in 19:36.

But coach Bob Waterman was happy for Keyes. "She ran a bad race in the sectionals," Waterman said of the Garret Mountain race in which Keyes finished a minute slower than her best time on that course. "I really think she overcame the butterflies in her stomach in this race," he said.

Hawthorne's Jennifer King missed the Meet of Champions by one spot and five seconds when she placed 11th in Group 2.

Joan Profita and Pam Farinella of Paul VI finished 13th and 14th in the Group 1 race. Eastern Christian's Darla Wisse was 26th.

In Group 3, Lakeland's Laura Riebold finished 19th and Ramsey's Colleen Murphy came in 23rd.

HOLMDEL — The girls' teams proved to be the stronger of the local entries running in the state cross country group championships on Saturday. Both the Ridgewood and Kinnelon girls qualified for the Meet of Champions, to be held here next week, with strong first and second-place finishes respectively in their groups.

On the boys' side, only two individual runners, Tom Hughes of Ridgewood and Jose Rubiani of Pope Pius, were able to place high enough to run next

week.

The Ridgewood girls were by far the most impressive victors, scoring 37 points in the Group IV race. The Maroons were led by the Mileski twins, Mary Ellen (19:24) and Pat (19:41), who finished third and seventh. The two sophomores were followed by Carol Dickstein (19:55), Kathy Duffy (19:58) and Sue Hart (20:08), in 11th, 12th and 14th, to rout the nearest competition, Hunterdon Central, by 76 points.

"We've had some good luck, like getting a transfer student, and I'd like to think we train right, plus we have a couple of seniors. It's a little of everything," said Jock Brown, the Ridgewood girls coach. "The Mileskis are so good in that the other two kids, the seniors, are such good role

models."

The extent of the Maroons' victory would seem to make them the favorites in the overall girls' championship in the Meet of Champions. "The only team we're worried about (next week) is North Hunterdon. They might do the same thing in their race today, as we did in ours," Brown said.

North Hunterdon did better in the Group III race, finishing 2, 3, 6, 7, and 9, for an almost invisible 27 points. The next team was Randolph of Morris

County with 140 points, and comparing times, the Lions would actually be the slight favorites.

In Group I girls, Kinnelon placed second, primarily on the strength of sixth and seventh-place finishes by Inge Shuurmans (20:15) and Nancy Schmidt (20:17).

"We've been coming along, getting better every week," said Colt coach Ado Bolls. Kinnelon was first in the Section 2 finals last week, and in addition to Schuurmans and Schmidt, it will be taking Gina Boderck (20:40, 10th), Bonnie Keenan (21:28, 22nd) and Judi Strebinger (21:35, 25th) to Holmdel next week.

Tom Hughes of Ridgewood finished ninth in the boys' Group IV race and will run next week, but his effort was not enough to put his team into the finals. Ridgewood took fourth in that race, just out of the running. The first three teams, and the first 10 individuals in each group qualified.

"Hughes ran a decent race," said Ridgewood coach Larry Coyle. "We ran a good team race, but the competition was the toughest it's been in years, and Kevin Murphy (Ridgewood's fourth

runner) has been sick."

The competition was indeed strong in the Group IV race, with the eventual winner, Cliff Sheehan (15:50) of Westfield, shaving 18 seconds off the course record. Sheehan also became the first scholastic runner to break the 16minute mark on the 5000-meter circuit.

Ridgewood's unfortunate experience of just missing a Meet of Champions berth was repeated by some other local runners and teams. Jennifer King (20:14) of Hawthorne just missed a bid by finishing 11th in the girls' Group II race. Lisa Patktka (18:56), who breezed to victory in the Group II sectionals last week, repeated her performance in that race, winning by 33 seconds.

Ridgewood girls face challenge

HOLMDEL - Only one Bergen County cross-country team ever has earned New Jersey State Meet of Champions honors - the Bergen Catholic boys team of 1977. But Bergen County girls champion Ridgewood could be the second if the Maroons can overcome the strong challenge of North Hunterdon in Saturday's 11:30 a.m. championship race at Holmdel County Park.

The Margons and their southern rivals have met once earlier this year at the Eastern States race in the rain and North Hunterdon edged the Ridgewood team, 50-54. But both teams have improved since then and last week prepped for this

end-of-season battle with awesome group championship victories.

Ridgewood overwhelmed their Group 4 rivals in an easy 35-113 win over defending State champion Hunterdon Central and placed their top five runners in the top 14. Mary Ellen Mileski and twin sister Patty finished 3-7 and Carol Dickstein, Kathy Duffy, and Sue Hart were 11-12-14, leading Duffy to say: "I can't believe that there can be anyone better than us."

But North Hunterdon may be. The twosome of Sharon Greene and Tracey Bigley took 3-4, and Liz Ludwigson and Stacy Bilotta were 9-10 and Kim Borim was 12th in a 27-140 Group 3 rout of Randolph. On times, North Hunterdon has the edge with five runners under 20

minutes to Ridgewood's four.

Mary Ellen Mileski should be in the top 10 and Bergen County champion Pattie McCluskey of Dumont should be fifth behind Lisa Pakutka of Hopatcong, Janet Smith of J.P. Stevens, Terri Gschwind of Summit, and Meg Waldron of Bernards, the pre-race favorites. Mary Ellen McGowan of Pascack Valley always runs well at Holmdel, and individual qualifier Eileen Keyes of Tenafly should finish in the top 30.

The boys picture isn't as rosy. Bergen Catholic, the only boys team entered, could get fourth behind Christian Brothers Academy of Lincroft, Bernards, and Westfield, but they must improve on last week's excellent effort to do so. Tom Hughes of Ridgewood is potentially one of the best five runners in the State, but he had a subpar race last week and must improve by 15 seconds to break into the top five.

Ridgewood girls aim for NJ sweep

HOLMDEL — Cathy Duffy's smile and composure were no indication that she had just completed a 5000-meter race over a grueling cross country course.

The Ridgewood High School senior was happy because the girls team, of which she is captain, had just won the state Group IV title. Duffy was also looking forward to returning to Holmdel County Park the following Saturday for the state-Meet of Champions.

The Group IV race had been one of the earliest last Saturday. The team that is expected to battle Ridgewood for the Meet of Champions crown, North Hunterdon, would run later in the day in the Group III race.

Duffy said, she and her team would not be able to stay to witness their rival's race. If the Maroons had seen North Hunterdon, a squad which had beaten them earlier this season in New York race, compete Saturday they would have been impressed. The Central Jersey champions beat the Group III field even more easily than Ridgewood had vanquished the Group IV competition.

Ridgewood had placed five runners in the top 14 and four posted times under 20 minutes for the hilly course. North Hunterdon's fifth runner placed 13th and was timed in 19:55. Marge DeMarruis, the Group III champs No. 6, finisher (only five count in the team score) was only 12 seconds over 20 minutes and she would go on the next day to

capture the N. J. Athletic Congress Junior Olympic cross country championship.

Ridgewood's girls know they will have to be at their best this Saturday. They also expected a tough competition last Saturday but the end result was virtually a run-away for the Maroons.

The Ridgewood runners were not at the front of the pack as it reached the top of the hill, about three-fourths of a mile into the 3.1 mile race.

Duffy explained that the Maroons, who had made a special training trip to Holmdel the previous Saturday, knew that the first portion of the course was a tough hill so they saved their strength.

"We made our move at the bowl," said Duffy. The bowl is a grassy downhill and then uphill section at the middle of the

course.
While the Ridgewood runners bided their time, Janet Smith a ninth grader at J. P. Stevens High School of Edison and junior Liza Szymanski of Toms River East fought for the lead. Smith dominated and Szymanski fell back as Lori Butterfield of Hunterdon Central took up the chase.

With a mile to go Smith had a 30-yard lead on Butterfield and Ridgewood sophomore Mary Ellen Mileski was in hot pursuit another 80 yards back. There was no catching the leaders on the final downhill run and the Ridgewood runner settled for third.

Back in the pack, twin sister Pat Mileski was also moving up and she finished seventh. Maroons Carol Dickstein and Duffy improved their positions and they, respectively, placed 11th and 12th. Sue Hart completed the Ridgewood scoring, sprinting home in 14th place.

Non scoring finishers were Coach Jock Brown's Maroons were Chris Mc Kenna in 30th and ninth grader Anja Kannengieser, 70th. More than 130 girls finished the race.



Boys' season was well balanced

The boys' cross country season was one where few individuals or teams established a clear-cut dominance over the others. Ridgewood had the best team in The News area and the best runner, but beyond that it was a season where some started strong and faded while others started slowly and gained momentum as the fall wore on.

No one meet was used in determining the all-area team, but rather a collection of meets including the Passaic County Coaches' Invitational, the Passaic County championships, the Section I and II finals, the state finals, and in some cases, dual meets were considered.

Coach Russ DeVries, Wayne Valley

"Nobody realized we were good until near the end of the season, and we didn't want anyone to know," is the way DeVries describes this past season. The Indians surprised a lot of people by finishing second in the Group IV sectionals, and running up an impressive 11-2 dual meet record, without the benefit of a single outstanding runner.

DeVries who teaches math at Wayne Valley, is a graduate of West Point and is very serious about his runners being good students. All five seniors on his squad have SAT scores above 1000 and two are above 1300. "The most important thing to me is that they be student-athletes," he says.

His team's success he attributes to having "six fast runners," and to a summer workout plan they followed almost religiously. "We knew we had a good team last June and I assigned goals for the summer and they did it. They ran three to four hundred miles over the summer," he said.

The training program led to the Indians

being in excellent shape at the beginning of the season, but not so much that they peaked early. DeVries feels they hit stride during the last three weeks and maintained it through the county meet, the sectionals, and

Sal Falletta, West Milford

"Sal peaked just at the right time," West Milford coach John Einreinhofer said. Indeed, the Highlander senior improved from meet to meet as the year went on. He took fourth in the Passaic County championships and sixth in the Group IV sectionals, ahead of all but two of the runners who beat him in the earlier county race.

Falletta improved even further in the state championships at Holmdel, with the highest finish of any Passaic runners and behind only Tom Hughes among News area harriers. Einreinhofer attributes Falletta's improvement to a change in his training program over the summer. "Sal runs year round and used to burn himself out. This time we cut down on his program in July and August and it worked."

Leon Finney, Eastside

Finney was not a natural talent in cross country when he started at Eastside four years ago, but determination and hard work elevated him to a premier position among area runners.

"He is very easily coached and really likes to work," said his coach, Don Bornstein. "There were times this year when he didn't think he had enough."

The work paid off most for the tall senior this season when he took first place in the Passaic County meet. In addition to his fine performance in the counties, Leon was fifth in the sectionals and ninth in the Passaic County Coaches Invitational.

Tom Hughes, Ridgewood

Tom was easily the best runner in The News area this season. The Ridgewood senior took first in the Bergen County championships, first in the Group IV sectionals and ninth in the state finals. An excellent scholar, his coach, Larry Coyle, says Hughes is a natural talent in that he uses everything available to him, including the coaching.

Tom also has a fierce competitive spirit, and according to Coyle, "the bigger the race, the more he gets up for it." Coyle is full of praise for the keystone of his sectionalchampion team. "Tom is an outstanding young man in every way. I admire him greatly."

Dennys Falcon, Passaic

Small in stature, Falcon makes for his lack of size with intelligence and dedication. A senior, and looking to go to college locally, he was tenth in the Passaic County Coaches Invitational, fifth in the Passaic County championships and seventh in the sectionals.

Coach Joseph Gouse calls him "one of the best runners runners I've had in nine years of coaching, he's very coachable, very intelligent and very dedicated; an outstanding person."

Tony Williams, Kennedy

Throughout most of this season, Williams was the man to beat in any race he entered. In the Passaic County Coaches Invitational he was fourth, in the Passaic County championships he was second, leading his team to a first-place finish, and in the sectionals he

Williams and Eastside's Leon Finney competed in one of the most interesting individual battles of the year, running against each other at seven different meets.

Only a sophomore, Williams is the only underclassman named to the first team this

For example, in the Section I, Group IV finals at Garret Mountain, they finished 1-2-3-4-6, an astounding feat for team running in a meet with nine other teams. Brown has coached girls' track since it

was started at Ridgewood in 1972 and has run the cross country program since its inception in 1974. He is a graduate of Penn State where he was a middle-distance runner, "good enough to go to the big Eastern meets, but not to win anything.'

Brown teaches health at Ridgewood and helps with the organization of the town's Memorial Day race, where he makes a couple of hundred dollars each year. The money gets pumped back into the crosscountry program at the high school for things like team pictures and candy bars or oranges, which are awarded to winners in

The Memorial Day race also serves the

intrasquad races.

purpose of drumming up enthusiasm in the town for running, and at least in the case of Mary Ellen Mileski, gives Brown an opportunity to see potential runners.

"I'm lucky that Ridgewood has people at the junior high school level who promote running also," Brown says.

Mary Ellen Mileski, Ridgewood

Success breeds success and few cross country teams, boys or girls can match the record of Brown at Ridgewood. One of the hallmarks of a viable program in any sport is to constantly integrate new team members to the team attitude.

This season the Maroons were a perfect example of what this means. The Mileski twins, Mary Ellen and Pat, became outstanding runners as sophomores, and Brown attributes this, in part, to the maturity of the

Mary Ellen was the faster of the twins, but not by much. She finished first in the sectionals and led the team to a Group IV team championship, and second in the state's Meet of Champions.

Pat Mileski, Ridgewood "The seniors (Kathy Duffy and Carol

Dickstein) were good team leaders. They are solid emotionally and have good self-confidence. The twins sometimes still don't know how to deal with the intense competition, but the seniors set the example and I could see the twins get better through the year. It's something the kids don't verbalize, but I can sense it," Brown said of his sophomore combo.

Quiet like her sister, Pat says it all on a cross country circuit. Were it not for Mary Ellen, she would have taken first place in most of Ridgewood's meets this year.

Laura Riebold, Lakeland Lancer coach Dick Shutte says about Riebold, "She's great. She's down to earth, runs on her own, and is very coachable.'

Among Riebold's accomplishments this season were first place in the Passaic County championships, a third in the Section 1, Group III final and 19th in the State Group III finals in Holmdel, three weeks ago.

Joan Profita, Paul VI

Profita, with a second in the county championship and a first in the Group I sectional, marked herself as on of the best small-school runners in the state. Along with Pam Farinella, she formed an almost unbeatable duo for Paul VI and with a little more depth, the Patriots could have been a power in cross country this season.
