Big North

Cliffside Park did not submit information

Dumont is led by league co-favorite, senior Karl Andre III and a strong junior class that includes all-division standouts Benjamin Sam and Brandon Peralta, Rylan DeCongilio, James Kelly and Noah Matlik. Senior newcomer Alberth Avila should be one of the Huskies top runners.

Dwight Morrow has a large group of returning runners and might be a contender. Seniors Joseph Paul, Pharoah Naggie, Brandon Cooper, Tevin Lee and Nicholas Tolliver, junior Christopher Seo and sophs Chamin Kwon and Jaelen Asuncion give veteran coach Lisa Oden a possible contender.

Fort Lee is the defending champions and with four returnees should be in the hunt again this year. Senior John Walsh should be ready to make the next step and battle Dumont's Andre in a rubber match for the league title. Walsh is the defending champion and Andrew won in 2023. Senior Eitan Elhanavov and juniors Daniel Bolgov and Preston Leon also return and soph Skyler Kim is an exciting newcomer.

Ridgefield Park is led by a potential breakout star in junior Edgar Quetama but senior Kiev Bayona is the only other returnee. The Scarlets are rebuilding as a team but hope to get Quetama to the Bergen Meet of Champions and State Group 2 meet.

Freedom

Hackensack has the top returnee in the area in senior Mike McGinnity, who, if he can stay healthy, could win several titles after chasing the now-graduated Luke Pash of Ridgewood the last two years. Juniors Kevin and Jelson Remache and senior Joel Tenezaca also return.

The addition of senior track stars Devin and Dustin DeCambre with the development of soph Erick Cardenas, junior Jaredt Chavez and senior Saul Lliguisupa could put the Comets in position to win its first league title since 2010 and first sectional, since 1998.

Northern Highlands is a team to watch in a much more wide open division than usual. Seniors Ryan Dyki and Alex Kao and juniors Jack Leiman, Nik Maltezos and Ale Gabriel-Raspa are joined by one of the top sophomores in the area in Mats Knutzen. The results could prove interesting.

Paramus has only two returning lettermen, senior Drew Santos and junior Dylan Clark, but newcomers senior Darien Clark, junior Akiya Mizobuchi and a trio of talented freshmen should help the Spartans rebuild.

Ramapo has a lot of experience in juniors Zach and Jake Bernstein and senior captain Ryan Ficarra and Zach Bernstein should be a contender in many of the better races. The Green Raiders might be ready to qualify for the State Group 3 meet for the first time since 2011.

It's a weird year for **Ridgewood**, sectional winners in 13 of the last 15 seasons, and six of the last seven BMOC titles. The Maroons have no runners with varsity experience although junior Dean Ackley and senior Alexander Brown have varsity experience on the track. Seniors Remy Choe and Ben Soong also provide great leadership and had great summers. Whether Ridgewood can continue to contend this year depends largely on a sophomore quartet of Jack Barsa, John Hoffman, Akash Patel and Jacob Lin. But coach Patrick Ryan is confident his boys have learned what it takes to succeed from watching the veteran squad that is now off to college.

Independence

Fair Lawn returns just one starter from last year's undefeated dual meet team in Aidan Rotondi and Joshua Yanez should be a competitive number two runner. The rest of the team are newcomers and the Cutters will rise and fall on their development.

Lakeland returns first team all-Passaic runners senior Evan Caldwell and freshman Daniel Seminara, and senior Jesse Freedman. Senior newcomer Zachary Raider could surprise and sophomore Micah Burt is improving rapidly. The Lancers are looking to turn last year's second place finishes in the league and Passaic County last year into firsts.

Passaic Valley has a small squad this year but senior Nico Flumenbaum, junior Elijah Paronia and sophs Jack and Colin Easterbrook should improve all season.

Wayne Hills returns five runners from a year ago, including senior All-Passaic star Wilson Stansfield and Santiago Gonzalez. The Patriots have an excellent group of sophs led by

Praneel Kumar, Joseph Alaya and Brandon Stone and add an interesting freshman in Landon Freaney.

It's a rebuilding year for **Wayne Valley** with only one varsity performer returning. Senior Aidan Barkley, junior Vansh Parmar, and sophs Gavin Magnolia and Pratyush Srivastava are the foundation for rebuilding the program.

West Milford returns four from last year's solid team, junior captain Matteo Balestrieri and seniors Noah Diodonet (also a captain), Ben Torres and Brody Scully and if freshman Griffin Kleinfeder develops quickly, the Highlanders should be equally good this year.

Liberty

Bergen Tech looks like a team on the rise, with four solid upfront performers led by senior Eshaan Maggon, who had a breakthrough spring season and should be a contender in races all the way through the sectionals. Senior amal Kaplan, and juniors Nicholas Saldana and Aidan Kim give the Knights a strong front of the pack. A large and enthusiastic group of athletes will fill out the pack, with freshman William Henry an intriguing newcomer. The Knights should contend in the league and beyond.

Clifton returns five lettermen from a year ago including senior all-Passaic runner Anthony Pichardo, junior Leo Spoon and senior Christian Cabanilla. Senior Adrian Wilson-King is a first year runner who is an excellent swimmer and should help immediately. If the Mustangs, loaded with great students, approach the season as if it's an Honors course, veteran coach John Pontes thinks they can surprise.

Kennedy returns Brandy Hernandez and Johan Secondino and hopes to win more than the one meet they won last fall.

Bergenfield seems to keep improving and producing outstanding runners and this year is no exception. Senior Jason Enrile is a contender for the Bergen County title and senior Sam Hill and juniors Aaron Campos Leon and Dalvin Mena Rodriguez are veteran contributors. Newcomers Brady Biggins, Dan Hill, Jordan Thomas and Ray Veloz will battle for varsity positions.

Demarest returns a top quartet of seniors Amadeo Bonde, Skye Lee, Markus White and junior Charles Kakkanatt from last year's team that won league and county group titles and lost the sectional by one point. Senior Liam Kenny and freshman Rafael Bonde should give the Norsemen a shot at the Triple Crown this fall.

Pascack Valley has one of the top runners in North Jersey in Marcus Koshy. The Panthers hope to surround him with runners like seniors Brian Slasinski and Sean Flynn and junior Connor Iwata can work together to provide an improved team.

Teaneck is light on experience with only senior Dereck Coleman returning. Sprinter Justin Johnson could be an interesting newcomer, but the Highwaymen need more.

Tenafly returns just two starters in seniors Fady Temimi and Matan Peleg. The Tigers look to Vincent Scolaro and Calvin Du for improvement as they develop camaraderie and work ethic.

Patriot

Indian Hills has a terrific returning junior core with all North Jersey honoree Frank Coppa, Ethan Gray, Lukas Kertesz, Chris Vigeant, Matt Mazur, Andrew Finale and Robbie Woodward the mainstays of the team. The Braves won the sectionals and were second in State Group 1 last year and could be a contender for the state title this year. They'll be in the mix at every meet they run. Soph Kaeden Kraft will also play a vital role.

Mahwah has a strong number one in senior Nick Lencsak and the Thunderbirds have four other varsity runners returning.

Pascack Hills returns two varsity runners in Tyler Lovett and Alfonso DiPopolo but junior varsity runners Aiden Schmidt, Christian Lee, Jake Farrar and Ryan Hughes have improved to the point when the top six runners are interchangeable.

Ramsey could be a dark horse team for big improvements this year. The Rams return junior first team selection Declan Finnegan and seniors Colin Dougherty, Jalen Hu, James Lepori and Quinn Hassan are also veterans. The Rams add some intriguing newcomers, including one of the areas top intermediate hurdlers in junior Giorgio Bruttini, junior Andrew Grunfelder and freshman Loukas Flarankos.

Westwood has a small turnout this year and returns just seniors Kaiden Gilroy and Luke Baumgartner. Senior newcomer Derek LeManquais joins freshmen Owen Gomme and Thomas Koch and everyone hopes to reach personal best goals as they become a team.

The return to full health of juniors Preston Neal and Ayden Mendez should make **Bergen Catholic** a very good team again. Seniors Dylan Brown and Luke Schoeler and juniors Ben Cha, Jack Falcone, and Jackson Hermann provide great backup on the varsity and sophs Paul Alzapiedi and Emerson De La Roca provide varsity depth. The Crusaders have a deep freshman team and more than 50 runners on the roster.

DePaul should be improved with junior returnees Adrian Consuegra and Evan Liranzo and soph Jax Miranda-Correia and newcomer (from soccer) Jack Coppa.

Don Bosco is likely to win its 18th BMOC title this fall, breaking a tie with Ridgewood for the most boys crowns. And while the senior-laden team obviously would relish that, the Ironmen's real goal is to return to the State Meet of Champions for the first time since 2016. Seniors Jacob Pullen (committed to Eastern Kentucky), Matt Maguire (headed to Binghamton), Ryan Pelosi and Owen Hickey and junior Matthias Fontao are a potent top five especially if Hickey is fully healthy. Junior Blake McCarthy and freshman Dan Telofski are promising varsity newcomers.

St. Joseph has its deepest and best team in years with eight experienced runners among the 30 athletes who reported. Seniors Darren Coyle and Joe Lizzi and junior AJ Villeda are the leaders and senior Jack Boyle, sophs Dean Tsocanos and Billy Boyhen and junior newcomer Jayden Papasavas are working hard to turn potential in success.
